CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

A studio-based course with emphasis on the understanding of *v* design dynamics of visual form. A basic course where you will be introduced to various concepts and projects using a variety of art media. The second part of the course will build upon the knowledge of Part I and colour theory.

Please note: This course is the second half of a full year course.

OBJECTIVES:

Students will:

- 1. Learn to perceive, identify and apply the basic elements of art, principles of design and the creative process. They will begin to communicate visually expressed information while understanding natural and abstract relationships.
- 2. Continue to equip themselves with a visual and verbal vocabulary.
- 3. Continue to develop and broaden critical and aesthetic criteria.
- 4. Broaden their awareness, understanding and aesthetic appreciation of art.
- 5. Further identify their own values in relationship to their environment.
- 6. Develop basic skills and techniques.

Mid-term number based upon assignments completed. To date. Mid-term is an indicator grade only for the student's reference on his/her performance in the course. The weight between *In Class Process and Project Assignments* will reflect the portion of the class time spent in those areas of study.

In Class Process assignments reflects the activity in class that day and will be very short. Hence they will be due at the end of the specific class for marking. (There will be no extensions for any reason) Failure to finish projects on time for class critiques will affect student's final evaluation. Students will be expected to invest a minimum of four hours a week in the class.

EXAMINATIONS:

No examines, assignment and process grading is on going and as per assignment due dates. Portfolios may be required mid and end term.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

Class Expectations, students will:

- Bring the required supplies for every class. If you have missed a previous class it is your responsibility to ask your fellow students or the instructor before the start of class to insure that you have the appropriate supplies and materials ready.
- **Be punctual!** If you arrive late you will have to ask your classmates for the information. You are fully responsible for the material covered in class, projects and due dates. I will not be delivering one to one classes or lectures.
- Be prepared to take notes and save class handouts. Handouts will not be given out twice.
- Take home assignments are due promptly at the start of due class. If you cannot attend class have a classmate <u>hand it to me personally in class</u> and identify the situation.
- As this is a shared studio space and due to **health and safety reasons** it is expected that you will put your materials, drawings, easels and drawing boards away at the end of class. **Any** materials left outside of storage may not be there when you return.
- Respect and take pride and care of your work. You will need examples for your portfolios to apply to other institutions.

- Late assignments will lose 10% grade for each day late. After 10 days you will receive a zero grade. It is your responsibility to get your work to me. I will not be asking you for late work! Late work must be handed to in person person
- No use of iPods or MP3 players in the studio/classroom, all cell phones must be turned off, no texting.

COURSE SCHEDULE/TENTATIVE TIMELINE:

AR 1370 will broaden the students understanding of the basic elements of design: form, line, shape, value, texture, colour, space and the principles of organization: rhythm, balance, scale/proportion, and movement with an emphasis on exploration and production of concepts and visual images. The student will continue to explore seeing/identifying, imagining and problem solving with emphasis on an individual and collective creative approach. There will be illustrated lectures and video to convey specific concepts. Demonstrations of techniques and materials will be given to further the exploration capabilities of the student thus contributing to an understanding of the relationship between art and other disciplines. The course will thoroughly study colour theory and further examine both two and three dimensional design elements and principles as they relate to the further development of concepts and individual problem solving.

The instructor directs course projects and/or assignments. Following an assignment's deadline, no further class time can be devoted, although students are encouraged to improve their work based on insights and comments expressed during class discussions and critiques. Students are expected to work outside of class time approximately 4 -6 hours per week. Overdue portfolios/ assignments are penalized 10% per day.
