CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

A studio-based course with emphasis on the understanding of two and three dimensional design dynamics of visual form. A basic course where you will be introduced to various concepts and projects using a variety of art media. The second part of the course will build upon the knowledge of Part I and study color theory. **Please note: This course is the second half of a full year course.**

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Learn to perceive, identify and apply the basics of elements of art, principles of design and the creative process. They will begin to communicate visually expressed information while understanding abstract and pictorial relationships.
- 2. Continue to equip them with a visual and verbal vocabulary.
- 3. Continue to develop and broaden critical and aesthetic criteria.
- 4. Broaden their awareness, understanding and aesthetic appreciation of art.
- 5. Further, identify their own values in relationship to their environment.
- 6. Develop basic skills and techniques.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. To broaden the students understanding and working knowledge of the elements and principles of visual language. Basic elements of design: form, line, shape, value, texture, colour, space and the principles of organization: rhythm, balance, scale/proportion and movement.
- 2. An emphasis on the exploration and the thinking skills required in the production of a dynamic composition.
- 3. The student will begin to explore seeing/identifying, imagining and problem solving with emphasis on an individual and collective creative approaches, thus, contributing to their understanding and appreciation of the relationship between art and other disciplines
- 4. Demonstrate self-disciple required to make art in a professional manner.
- 5. Further build and construct in both two and three-dimensional design.

EVALUATIONS:

There are no exams, *Project Assignment and In Class Lab Activities* grading is on going, as per assignment due dates. Portfolios may be required mid and end term.

Mid-term number based upon assignments completed to date. Mid-term is an **indicator grade only for the student's reference** on his/her performance in the course. The weight between *In Class Lab Activities and Project Assignments* will reflect the portion of the class time spent in those areas of study.

In Class Lab activities reflects the activity in class that day and they will be short. Hence they will be due at the end of the specific class for marking. You cannot make up a lab activity due to an absence. There will be no extensions for any reason.

Failure to finish projects on time for class critiques will affect student's final evaluation. Students will be expected to invest a minimum of four hours a week in the class.

- Be prepared to take notes and save class handouts. Handouts will not be given out twice.
- Take home assignments are due promptly at the start of due class. If you cannot attend class have a classmate <u>hand it to me personally in class</u> and identify the situation.
- Returned Lab and Assignments Works will only be handed back once; if you are absent they will be placed in the return drawer for your class. After which I will no longer be responsible for their safekeeping.
- Work must be handed in the designated portfolio or as requested.
- As this is a shared studio space and due to **health and safety reasons** it is expected that you will put your materials, drawings, easels and drawing boards away at the end of class. **Any materials left outside of storage may not be there when you return.**
- Respect and take pride and care of your work. You will need examples for your transfer portfolios when applying to other institutions. *Expect to have a portfolio of works when applying for transfer.*
- Late assignments will lose 10% grade for each day late. (Includes week ends) After 10 days, you will receive a zero grade. It is your responsibility to get your work to me.
- I will not be asking you for late work!
- Late work must be handed to in person. Or placed on the table in the foyer of Studio A, <u>Email</u> me if you placed your work on the foyer table.
- DO NOT WAIT UNTILL NEXT CLASS TO HAND IN LATE WORK IT IS ALREADY LATE!

- If you are **absent for an extended period time** to due health reasons, a doctor's slip is required. **At which time alternative assignment due dates can be set up**
- No use of iPods or MP3 players in the studio/classroom, all cell phones must be turned off, no texting.
