CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

A studio-based course with emphasis on the understanding of two and three dimensional design dynamics of visual form. A basic course where you will be introduced to various concepts and projects using a variety of art media. The second part of the course will build upon the knowledge of Part I and study color theory.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Learn to perceive, identify and apply the basics of elements of art, principles of design and the creative process. They will begin to communicate visually expressed information while understanding abstract and pictorial relationships.
- 2. Continue to equip themselves with a visual and verbal vocabulary.
- 3. Continue to develop and broaden critical and aesthetic criteria.
- 4. Broaden their awareness, understanding and aesthetic appreciation of art.
- 5. Further, identify their own values in relationship to their environment.
- 6. Develop basic skill and techniques.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. To broaden the students understanding and working knowledge of the elements and principles of visual language. Basic elements of design: form, line, shape, value, texture, colour, space and the principles of organization: rhythm, balance, scale/proportion and movement.
- 2. An emphasis on the exploration and the thinking skills required in the production of concepts and composition.
- 3. The student will continue to explore seeing/identifying, imagining and problem solving with emphasis on an individual and collective creative approaches, thus, contributing to their understanding and appreciation of the relationship between art and other disciplines
- 4. Thoroughly study and analyze colour theory while starting to critique and understand the basics of painting as a process in both abstract and pictorial space.
- 5. Demonstrate self-disciple required to make art in a professional manner.
- 6. Further build and construct in both two and three-dimensional design.

EVALUATIONS:

There are no examinations.

a. There will be **quizzes and open note reviews** on class presentations/lectures, visiting artists and designated white board notes. **Expect a quiz or review for each lecture and visiting artist presentation.**

Short quizzes and reviews under 15 points cannot be made up if you are absent or arrive after it is finished. They will take place at the start of a class.

b. Lab work is graded on an ongoing basis. Lab work reflects the daily class activity for that day. Hence, they will be due at the end of the class for marking. Lab work may also include preparation for the next class. These day-to-day marks are average, the percentage is weighted to reflect the amount of class time ranging from 20-25 percent. **There will be no extensions for missed Lab work for any reason.**

c. Series of small portfolios, 4 to 6 will be required through out the course.

They will cover 2 to 3 assignments or an area of study rather than a half term of assignments.

Following an assignment's last class, no further class time can be devoted. The portfolio will be due 1 to 2 weeks later. This will give you enough time to improve and complete the work if needed. You are encouraged to get feed back during class time once the assignment for that day has started. If you choose to work on an assignment that has already closed rather the assignment of the day you will be counted as absent.

Portfolios will always be due on a Friday by 4:00 pm in Studio A.

Failure to submit portfolio by the due dates will affect student's final evaluation.

Late portfolio will lose 10% per day. This includes weekends. If late, place it on the table in the foyer of Studio A and email me. I will pick it up.

d. The Mid-Term grade indicator is based only on assignments completed to date.

The Mid–Term is an indicator grade only for your reference.

Students will be expected to invest a minimum of four hours a week in the class

Excessive Late Adjustment Factor:

You are required to sign in when you arrive.

COURSE SCHEDULE/TENTATIVE TIMELINE:

COURSE LOCATION: Art Studio A

DATES and TIME: January 8 to April 11, No Classes on Feb. 19 to 21. Monday and Wednesday 8:30 am to 11:20 am

AR1370 will cover the basic elements of design, including the following: colour, form, line, shape, value, texture, composition and space. The principles of organization including rhythm, balance, scale/proportion and movement will also be reinforced. These principles will be investigated and applied to both two and three-dimensional work. Students will be introduced to seeing and working from observation, being able to identify

and to work on correcting problems in a piece of work. The elements studied in this course are intended to provide a broad foundation of experience and knowledge for students to apply in future visual courses.

The instructor directs course projects and/or assignments. Students are expected to work outside of class time approximately 4 -6 hours per week. Overdue portfolios/ assignments are penalized 10% per day.

Over View

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:
