## **CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:**

This course will explore a specific issue (to be determined by the instructor) using a variety of genres and media. Instruction will include essay writing skills. Because the course content will vary among instructors, it is strongly recommended that students consult an academic advisor or the Department of Arts and Education for more specific descriptions regarding the course focus.

#### **PREREQUISITE(S)/COREQUISITE:**

Successful completion of English 30 (or equivalent of Grade 12 English)

#### **REQUIRED TEXT/RESOURCE MATERIALS:**

*The Murder of Roger Ackroyd* - Agatha Christie *Busman's Honeymoon* - Dorothy Sayers (Other readings will be made available on Moodle or as handouts) Note: Please use the editions on sale at the Bookstore. If, however, you use other editions, please make certain that they are all unabridged.

**DELIVERY MODE(S):** Course work includes lectures, class discussions, group work, in-class quizzes, online assignments, film, and individual work, both written and oral.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES:** This course will explore the early period of Detective Fiction, focusing on its beginnings as an elegant art of detection involving locked doors and complex puzzles. We will examine the formation of the formal genre, including the literary "rules" agreed upon by the early Detection Club, whose members notably included Dorothy Sayers, G.K. Chesterton, and Agatha Christie. From there, questions surrounding the modern fascination with crime as entertainment will be considered, investigating society's obsession with the darkest side of humanity and the corresponding impulse to discover, reveal, and punish. **LEARNING OUTCOMES:** Students who successfully complete this course should be able to

- use their writing to analyze thoughts and to express ideas effectively
- use their writing to respond critically to another piece of writing or prompt
- plan, outline, and draft essays that develop a specific thesis
- revise a text, adjusting style and content for specific purposes and audiences
- proofread writing for surface errors and correct the majority of these errors
