FR0120 (B2): Beginner French I Grade 11 Equivalent - 5 (5-0-0) HS/UT 75 Hours for 15 Weeks

CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

This is the entry-level course for students who have chosen French. Basic conversational vocabulary will be covered, as well as verbal structures including past tense. You will develop aural/oral skills through drills, directed dialogue and music.

****Please note:** FR0120 and FR0130 together are equivalent to the French 10, 20, and 30 programs in high school. The course moves at a rapid pace because it covers approximately the same content included in the three-course high school program. Nevertheless, FR0120 is a beginner's course and no prior knowledge of French is required or expected.

DELIVERY MODE(S)

The delivery mode will consist of lectures explaining grammatical concepts, vocabulary, and cultural elements as well as group and individual oral, written, and reading exercises reinforcing these concepts.

In preparation for exams, most of our in-class time will focus on the essential *Contextes, Structures, Vocabulaire*, and *Expressions utiles of Promenades (Chapters 1-5)*. As time permits, students will also be introduced to the *Roman-photo, Lecture culturelle, Synthèse, Écriture* and *Savoir-Faire* sections, work on practice quizzes, and become capable of working independently both inside and outside of class. In addition, a combined **Workbook/Lab manual** with online reference is to be completed by students and provides opportunity for repetition and self-correction. The course moves at a **rapid pace** as it covers approximately the same content contained in the three-course high school program.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

In FR0120, the primary objective is to develop skills in all four language areas - listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Upon successful course completion, students will have knowledge and competency with reading, writing, speaking, and understanding. You will learn basic vocabulary, grammar, common expressions for conversation, and simple sentence structures, including how to ask questions and how to answer them - in the present and the future.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the end of the semester, the student who completes this course will be able to:

- read and understand short sentences, conversations, and texts;
- write simple sentences and paragraphs using basic grammatical structures and verb tenses (present, and near future), to ask and answer questions or express themselves at a fundamental level;
- understand simple expressions, questions, and conversations in French;
- speak and interact using basic grammatical structures, vocabulary, and verb tenses to express themselves on common topics;
- understand common cultural expressions and appreciate the French culture in a diverse French-speaking world.

FR0120 is worth **5 credits** and consists of **five hours** of instructional time each week. As a university transfer course, it is worth **3 university transfer credits**. At the **University of Calgary** and **MacEwan University**, FR0120 is worth 3 credits but only if it is combined with FR0130 (3 credits).

1. Attendance, Participation, and French Club Cultural Activities

Your attendance, punctuality, participation, and contribution to creating a positive interactive learning environment will affect your learning and contribute to your grades. Participation and attendance are worth **10%**. Students earn **8%** of this percentage through regular attendance, class participation, and contribution to a positive interactive learning environment. The remaining **2%** of the attendance/participation mark is earned by attending at least 2 (two) **GPRC French Club cultural activities** (French movie nights, the French Tutor Centre, and other cultural events). The French Club cultural activities schedule will be communicated to you early in the term.

2. Workbook/Video Manual, Lab Manual and supplementary online activities

Language acquisition depends on contact with and repeated use of concepts taught in class. The Workbook/Video Manual and Lab Manual are accessible online and are to be completed and submitted for grading online outside of class time. The online Supersite provides many additional activities to support you with many possible opportunities to hear, speak, and read French. Online chat with classmates is available. **Workbooks are graded online.**

3. Unit Compositions/Écriture

The topic specific writing assignments are listed below and should be enriched with vocabulary and grammar learned within each unit. The **Unit compositions are DUE IN CLASS on the unit exam day.** Keep a copy of all written work. In the event of loss or theft, the student will be required to submit a duplicate copy.

4. Unit tests/Tests d'unités

There are 5 Unit Tests and each unit will take about **TWO WEEKS** to cover. Upon completion of each unit, students will gain feedback on their progress through a written unit test. (Units 1 – 5). Unit exams **cannot be made up**, but in the case of a medical emergency with an official doctor's note, may be excused.

5. Final Exam

A final comprehensive **Written Exam** consisting of written and listening/ parts and will be scheduled by the Registrar. The **Oral Exam** will take place during the last week of classes.
