CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This course will cover more detailed grammatical patterns, including verb tenses and their uses. Aural/oral skills will continue to develop through increased use of French in class and laboratory practice.

CREDIT/CONTACT HOURS:

French 0130 is a 5 credit course and will consist of 5 contact hours of instructional time each week.

DELIVERY MODE(S):

The delivery mode will consist of lecture explaining grammatical concepts, vocabulary, and cultural elements as well as group and individual oral, written, and reading exercises reinforcing these concepts. Most in-class time will focus on the Vis-à-vis textbook material Chapters 7-12 as well as Chapter Vidéoblogs. In addition, a combined workbook/lab manual with answer key is completed by students and provides opportunity for self-correction. The course moves at a **rapid pace** because it covers approximately the same content contained in the three-course high school program.

COURSE OUTCOMES:

French 0130 students will continue to develop all four language skills-listening, speaking, reading and writing- and will learn basic vocabulary and language structures needed to discuss and write about everyday topics in the present, the past and the future. Students will further develop their ability to communicate by working on pronunciation and enunciation skills and will discover a new freedom of expression in French.

1. **Chapter Quizzes** – Short written take-home quizzes to check your knowledge of vocabulary and/or grammar presented in the “Leçons”. Expect approximately one per chapter.
2. **Chapter Tests** – Each “Chapitre” comprises 4 “Leçons”. Upon completion of the chapter, a written chapter exam will be given. These are 1 hour tests that will examine your facility with the vocabulary and grammatical structures covered in the 4 lessons of the chapter.

5. **Final Exam** – A final comprehensive exam consisting of written and listening parts will be scheduled by the Registrar.

Your attendance, punctuality, and participation will affect your learning and contribute to your grades. Quizzes are take-home. Compositions are topic specific and should be enriched with relevant chapter vocabulary and grammar structures. Workbook and compositions are due on Chapter exam days. **Late workbooks and compositions must be submitted on the due date.**

3. Practice – Language acquisition depends on contact with and use of the language. Avail yourself of every possible opportunity to hear, speak, and read French (TV, radio, magazines, etc). You are encouraged to find someone with whom you may practice and study. Helpful sites are :
